
Black/white binary





"The concept of ethnorace, then, might be defined as pertaining to groups who have both ethnic and racialized characteristics, who are a historical people with customs and conventions developed out of collective agency, but who are also identified and identifiable by bodily morphology that allows for both group affinity as well as group exclusion and denigration."

"A group of Black women at the National Women's Conference in 1977 response to the inclusion of other ethnic women who were not Black: "women of color" was created. Okay? And they didn't see it as a biological designation—you're born Asian, you're born Black, you're born African American, whatever—but it is a solidarity definition, a commitment to work in collaboration with other oppressed women of color who have been 'minoritized'."
